


BUTTE COLLEGE WILDLIFE REFUGE & NATURAL AREA

"Birding through the Veil of Winter"

As the snow falls in the mountains and the darkness of winter takes hold, the outside world seems to sleep. But the rising sun of each winter day signals the start of the brief daily feeding period for all our wintering birds. Many species, like the Nuttall's Woodpecker and Spotted Towhee, reside permanently in the region, adapting to winter with simple changes in behavior. Other birds, such as the Snow Goose and Rough-legged Hawk, travel thousands of miles to enjoy our relatively mild winters, while their arctic breeding grounds are shrouded in ice.

Join Oregon naturalist and author Stephen Shunk as he shares stories of winter discovery in his life as a professional birder. You will gain a new appreciation for our wintering avian visitors as Steve shares his favorite winter birding experiences from Northern California and beyond.

Celebrating the Art of the Pacific Flyway



Preparing a local juried competition of wildlife art

hico's 2010 Snow Goose Festival includes a special art exhibit. Artists whose sub-*■*jects include wildlife and habitat along the Pacific Flyway were invited to submit art work for the juried exhibition to take place during the Festival. All media were considered in the competition and the resulting body of work is as varied as it is beautiful, reflecting the tastes and backgrounds of the jury, itself a great mix of art and nature experts.

The jurors are Christina Aranguren (widely acclaimed local artist), Jackie Ferrier (biologist at the Sacramento National Wildlife Refuge), Mike Fisher (naturalist and co-vice president of the Altacal Audubon Society), Jennifer Patten (cofounder and coordinator of the Snow Goose Festival and co-vice of the Altacal Audubon Society), Maria Phillips (artist, art historian and owner of Avenue 9 Gallery & Art Guild), Sue Scott (art and nature lover, long-time birder and member of the Snow Goose art committee), and Darah Votaw (artist and co-owner of The Artistry at All Fired Up!).

Once the show is installed, the jury panel will make a number of Jurors' Commendations to be announced at the opening reception. In addition, the galleries are hosting the very popular People's Choice Awards (one for each gallery) and these will be accompanied by modest cash awards donated by the viewers who participate in the vote during the exhibit. Awards of merit will go to winning artists as further appreciation of the amazing interpretations of nature and extraordinary vision they offer the community. Twenty-six artists are represented.

The art exhibit runs from Friday January 22 through Sunday February 7, with a Sneak Preview Saturday January 23, 5:30-8:30, and a formal reception Friday January 29, 5:30-8:30 p.m. The exhibit is held at two galleries, Avenue 9 Gallery & Art Guild (Uptown) and The Artistry at All Fired Up! (Downtown). This will be the 4th year of the Uptown-Downtown Snow Goose Art Exhibit and the first year that it extends to cover Pacific Flyway (one of the entries is from Chile). A free trolley ride connects the visitors and transports them to the two galleries on the night of the reception. Free and ample parking is available in the parking lot of the Chico Nut Company at the corner of 9th Avenue and Oleander.

This is a catered affair, complete with wine, food (Bacio Catering), and live music (jazz by Shigemi Minetaka and Nathan Furgason at The Artistry; Rudy Giscombe and Greg D'Augelli at Avenue 9). The cost is \$10/adult, \$5/youth and reservations can be made online (www.snowgoosefestival.org). The Sneak Preview on January 23rd is free to the public.

The Uptown-Downtown Pacific Flyway Art Exhibit has grown from a casual affair with pictures propped up on easels in a rec center to this professionally-mounted elaborate show of the best the north state has to offer. To make the viewing experience even richer, Jackie Ferrier has provided excellent interpretive material for the labels. For 2010 the juried process of the exhibit is a fully-integrated educational component of the Snow Goose Festival and promises to be a good model for the years to come. This is a mustsee for Chico residents and visitors alike.

South on Interstate 5, take Antelope Blvd. exit and turn east. then turn right on Sale Lane and continue down the road where you will see the center.
